360 degree safe online safety mark

Bristnall Hall Academy is proud to announce that it has been accredited with the '360 Degree Safe Award.'

In September 2017, we became one of only a few Sandwell schools to be presented with this prestigious award. Mrs Susan Courtney Donovan, the 360 Degree Safe Award assessor, stated "The communication across the academy is very strong, all understand what the aims for online safety are and work together within their positive, nurturing ethos." Mrs Courtney Donovan also reported that "There is a strong, positive working relationship across the team that lead on Online Safety, visible through mutual respect of individual skills and experience." Mrs Courtney Donovan also commented that students have found recent online safety sessions delivered at the academy to be "inspirational and motivational". The fact that students feel safe whilst inside and outside of the academy, due to the academy's online safeguarding procedures emerged as a real strength.

Bristnall Hall Academy has strived to embed important aspects of online safety across the curriculum. From the very beginning of the accreditation process, all stakeholders recognised the need to ensure that online safety is a priority within the academy. As a result, steps have been taken to ensure that students are always safe and that they know, should they have an online safeguarding issue, they can find staff who are available to listen and provide support and advice.

Principal Vince Green added, "Bristnall Hall Academy and its staff will continue to develop further ways to strengthen online safety in the digital world in which we live. We will continue to involve and support parents and carers to ensure that online safety remains a focus. We are proud of the outstanding and sustainable programme for online safety that is already in place. The impact this has on the well-being and overall safety of the students is clear."

New facilities

We are continuing to transform facilities for our students to make their experience at Bristnall even better.

New toilets and washroom facilities were ready for students to use when they returned in the autumn. 


BEHIND THE SCENES

Name: Chloe Hudson

Briefly outline your time at Bristnall. What do you remember about Bristnall?

- In Year 10, I did my work experience with the languages department at Bristnall. I found Spanish very enjoyable so it was great to help students in lower years and I loved the staff, especially Mr Hipgrave and Miss Marston, so it was nice to spend time with them outside of the usual lessons.
- My favourite subject was Science, particularly Biology and my teachers Mr Liddle and Dr Juarez will always be two of my favourites.
- Winning the Pride of Bristnall award for Spanish is one of my fondest memories from school.

Destination after Bristnall (college/university) and subjects studied (A-level/Degree/ apprenticeship):

After my GCSEs at Bristnall, I stayed on at the Sixth Form for three years where I studied A-levels in Chemistry, Human Biology, Psychology and Spanish, with an AS in English Lit. I then continued to the University of Birmingham to study Biochemistry, and will hopefully graduate with a master's degree.

Give a memorable achievement or experience since leaving school (academic or personal):

Everything I have done since getting into uni! Moving out of home and becoming independent, getting accustomed to the work and teaching style. I finished my first year with a first-class mark, which was a great and surprising achievement! I also work as a student ambassador for the university which is huge for me as I deal with prospective students and parents, answer their questions, lead campus tours and, with previously low confidence, to be confident was quite a challenge to overcome.

What are you currently doing?

I am now in my second year of Biochemistry, planning on either spending my third year doing a professional placement or continuing to do a postgraduate master's after three years. I also do ninjutsu as a sport at uni which is a very fun martial art.

Future career path:

Currently undecided but potentially teaching in the sciences, most likely Biology and/or Chemistry, and maybe Spanish in the future. I am also considering more lab based work in a hospital or in forensics.

Words of advice for students:

Do what you enjoy, try hard and it can lead you to things you don't expect. Make the most out of school and take advantage of the support and opportunities while you can.
