SSAT Accredits Bristnall Hall Academy under the 'Framework for Exceptional Education.'

Bristnall Hall Academy's application to SSAT for accreditation of transforming practice in Climate for Learning and Variety of Teaching Approaches has been successful. This means that Bristnall Hall Academy met the highest standards of the Framework for Exceptional Education and that their work in this area is amongst the most effective practice nationally! The Framework for Exceptional Education is a self-review and planning tool incorporating SSAT's 30 years of experience in school improvement. Co-developed with a group of high-performing schools and reviewed by leading academies, the framework supports schools in quality-assuring their work and sharing effective practice.

To achieve accreditation in practice, Bristnall Hall Academy was reviewed by another high-performing academy and an independent moderator from SSAT. SSAT's Chief Executive, Sue Williamson comments "for a school to be accredited as transforming practice is a real credit to their team and the quality of work that they are doing."

We are extremely grateful to West Bromwich Building Society staff for delivering 'Money Matters' sessions free of charge to our young people.



Pi Day is celebrated on the 14th March around the world. Pi (Greek letter " π ") is the symbol used in Mathematics to represent a constant: the ratio of the circumference of a circle to its diameter is approximately 3.14159.

Every year Pi day is celebrated across the academy. This year, each department was given a Pi-related subject-specific activity to complete during their lesson. The activities ranged from tasks such as measuring the bendiness of a river in Geography; writing a poem in English; studying the History of Pi in History; writing a song about Pi in Music to baking cakes and piping them with the digits of Pi.

Classics Day Out

On Tuesday 12th March 2019, 30 high potential students from Years 7 and 8 attended a Classics-inspired day at Keble College, Oxford.

Students were given lots of information on university courses, potential careers and how to apply to Oxford. They also attended a lecture from a PhD student studying Latin and Ancient Literature. Lots of the students had previously studied some Latin as part of their enrichment activities. As such, they were amazing at de-coding ancient scripts and letters! The lecturer was amazed at their overall language skills and how they embraced the challenge of understanding the writing and language itself! It was a hugely aspirational experience and a fantastic day was had by all students and staff alike.





Speakers for schools

In March we had the pleasure of hosting a Speakers for Schools talk from Dr Jonathan Leach, Joint Honorary Secretary, Royal College of General Practitioners and his daughter Dr Helen Leach.

Our Year 9 students were fascinated by the presentation, in particular all the different careers available within the NHS and the paths they can take. Students were intrigued to learn that Dr Leach had started his career with the army; hearing about the various posts abroad before transferring his skills once having left the army.

Speakers For Schools is a charitable organisation set up by Robert Peston; it helps state schools to access amazing opportunities for their young people through inspiring talks. They have an array of today's most influential figures from across business, arts, politics and much more who donate their time to raise the aspirations of young people in state schools including those from disadvantaged backgrounds.



Aim Higher

As part of the Aim Higher programme, forty-nine Year 9 students spent an aspirational day at Aston University engaging in a careers workshop.

Students explored different career pathways and participated in a session on 'what makes the model student.' A really informative experience was had by all the students.

Harper Adams

On Friday 29th March 2019, 12 Year 10 students (plus Mr Patel and Miss Hole) ventured into the wilds of the Shropshire countryside to visit

Harper Adams University.

This university specialises in agricultural courses, including land-based, animal-based and engineering and this visit was to find out more about their Veterinary Nursing and Veterinary Physiotherapy degree courses plus their new Veterinary Science course. This is only the 9th Veterinary Science course in the country and the only one in the West Midlands. The students experienced mini-lectures and practical activities including making the foreleg of a dog and modelling the ruminant digestive system. The students also had a tour of the university buildings and accommodation. It was a great opportunity for the students to experience a different type of university, speak to current students and discover what to expect from this type of course. They couldn't believe the university students when they said you get used to the smell!!





CSI Day

A group of 19 Year 10 students got a chance to train to become forensic investigators for a day.

They were shown different skills that actual forensic students would learn at university. They made shoe impressions, fingerprint keyrings and looked at their own hair samples under mini microscopes. At the end of the day, students then had to put their forensic skills to the test and find out who the killer was in a mock crime scene. Students had a fun day out as the activities were interactive and engaging, thanks to Aim Higher who organised the day. A lot of students found it informative and are now interested in looking into forensics as a possible career path.



RDS & FILITIBERS

A group of Year 10 students visited Birmingham University to participate in a day of English and Mathematics sessions.

In the English session, students worked with poet
Matt Windle, who was the Birmingham Poet Laureate
(2016/18), and produced their own poems based on their
aspirations. Students worked in teams to discuss their
aspirations and what they needed to do to achieve them.
Matt's session focused on understanding the rhythm and
rhyming patterns in words and he was even able to rhyme
hippopotomonstrosesquippedaliophobia (ironically, it is the
fear of long words!). The session resulted in students creating
their own poems about aspirations and performing them
in front of others.

The Mathematics session included various hands-on activities for the pupils to complete. The activities were scaffolded for all abilities to use their problem-solving techniques to complete the challenge and then move on to the next task. They involved tangrams, jigsaws and tubes construction. Fishing for animals was the most enjoyable, since it included a blindfold, required teamwork, and a high level of instruction to pick up the animals at the correct angles. The session developed a multitude of skills and demonstrated how classroom skills where classroom skills have been transferred into problem solving methods for any situation.



BEAST BEAST

Yet again, this year, our young people put on another great production of Beauty and the Beast, over two evenings.

This included two matinee performances to Year 5 students from local primary schools who thoroughly enjoyed every minute of it. The hard work, dedication and commitment by students and staff alike was evident in the quality of the show. It was quite a magical and enthralling evening with such talented young people.

The Modern Foreign Languages department at Bristnall Hall have been running a very successful revision weekend at Edgmond Hall in Newport Shropshire for the past 11 years.

This year has been no exception. The weekend of the 5th – 7th April, a full capacity crowd was once again enjoying the peace of the countryside, the sunshine – and of course, lots of revision activities for their GCSE French examinations, due to take place towards the end of May. 54 students from Year 11 dedicated their weekend to perfecting their language skills including listening, reading and writing in the target language.

As well as lots of pair-work, group-work and the obligatory visit to the local store for food supplies, students were engaged in a treasure hunt and orienteering, where they had to complete different GCSE-style tasks, including understanding longer texts in French. The students were a credit to the academy and really enjoyed the weekend. They all worked extremely hard and gained in confidence with the requirements of their examinations.


