The Woman in Black

Peer teaching on the context of The Woman in Black.

Peer teaching is a strategy whereby students interact and work with other students in the classroom to help each other learn.

In order for Year 11 to understand the themes within the novel, they were all put into groups and given specific information packs about the context in which The Woman in Black was set in, from the role of women in 19th century Britain, to the belief in the supernatural.

Once the groups had thoroughly studied their information, they then turned what they had learned into a visual display. This display was then used by a group member to peer teach other members of the class about the specific contextual area they were given.

The remaining students visited other learning stations and 'teachers' ran by other groups, and learned about the other key contextual areas.

With everyone in each group now an expert in a particular area, students then relayed the information they learned about the contextual area they visited, back to their groups.

This peer teaching, carousel lesson was an extremely effective learning tool for students as it gave them ownership of their learning, allowed them to consider different points of view and interpretations in an interactive manner, as well as being solely student led.

Commemorative Centenary

The 4th of August 2014 marked the 100th anniversary of the day Britain entered one of the costliest conflicts in history – the First World War – with fighting continuing until the 11th of November 1918, Armistice Day.

Little Dragons



SPoCC

A former student of Bristnall Hall Academy, Adam Hancox, 25, was tragically killed in a car accident on the 23rd November 2014. Before his death, Adam was raising money for the charity 'SPoCC', which offers support to children treated at Birmingham Children's Hospital suffering with cancer and their families.

As part of fundraising he climbed Ben Nevis with his best friend, Jack Hughes, another former student of Bristnall Hall, as part of the 'Three Peaks Challenge', just one month before his death. Jack said that Adam had urged him to finish the Ben Nevis challenge when he felt as if he could not go on. Although Adam went on to complete the 'Three Peaks Challenge', Jack floundered and only accomplished two of the peaks. However, after Adam's death, Jack vowed to complete the final mountain, Snowdon, as an emotional tribute to his best friend.

Therefore, on 5th April 2015, a group of Adam's family and friends, including employees of Bristnall Hall, completed the challenge by climbing Snowdon in memory of Adam. Bristnall Hall Academy's staff and students have helped with fundraising towards SPoCC and are well on their way to reaching £1,000. Once the fundraising is complete all money will be given to SPoCC. Adam's original target was to raise £500 but now the figure currently stands at a staggering £6,280, with Bristnall Hall Academy's donation. Premier League Challenge



A respectable second place!

The Premier League Enterprise Challenge is an annual event where Premier League and Football League Club Community Organisations delivering Premier League Enterprise initiatives, schools, community groups and young people take part in an exciting national competition. Now in its sixth year, the Premier League Enterprise Challenge is supported by the Department of Business, Innovation and Skills and has become an important milestone in the Premier League Communities events calendar. Over 8,000 young people have taken part in the challenge to date. The competition is aimed at providing pupils aged 14-19 years old with the opportunity to learn basic principles of business and self-employment through interactive learning opportunities. The Barclays Premier League Chief Executive, Richard Scudamore, set this year's

challenge, which was for the teams to imagine that they worked in a club's Sales and Marketing Department and had to increase the number of families attending home matches. Albion's Sales and Marketing Director, Adrian Wright, kicked off the proceedings with a rousing speech designed to motivate the groups, before they were asked to deliver presentations to a panel of five judges from Midlands Heart, The Albion Foundation and Ice Blue Design & Marketing. The judges initially struggled to pick a winner taking over 30 minutes to reach a decision. Our team of amazing Year 12 students took a very respectable second place. Speaking after the event, James Long, The Albion Foundation's Enterprise Co-ordinator said: "The challenge was a great success, with over 500 participants taking part. The standard of the presentations were incredible and all of the schools and colleges taking part should be very proud."

The Experience of Success!

Bristnall Hall students completed work experience in February with 96% of Year 10 students securing a placement.

Work experience is crucial for young people and those who have experienced the workplace and work related activities are 5 times less likely to be not in education, training or employment post 16.

Learning in the workplace allows young people to develop skills and it can motivate and inspire them. It has been a big step for some of our students but they have really risen to the challenge. From a residential week with the army to experiences of large employers such as Metsec, Geopost, Asda, Sandwell Council and Costa Coffee and to small, local businesses such as RePC, Solair Ltd and Ace Embroidery, our students have enjoyed a varied week of work experience. Some students even completed two weeks of work experience!

We have received some amazing feedback about our students: "I would advise if he chose the Armed forces for a career to look at taking the Officer route" Sgt McCosh reporting about Yohan Lutchmeenaraidoo. Govind Dewitt spent his week at Sandwell Council and they were so impressed with him that they asked the Mayor of Sandwell to present him with his work experience certificate!
