Our GCSE results are now amongst

the highest in Sandwell for many measures of progress and attainment and we are proud to be the most improved school in the area. In our sixth form, all students achieved two or more A Levels, which is above the national average.

Students that have been supported and guided by the superb team of staff here, now have the qualifications that will support them as they embark on further study, apprenticeships or the world of work. We strive to ensure that all of our young people have the qualifications and BHA employability skills and attributes that will set them apart from others in the job market.

Over the past year, we have continued to invest heavily in our facilities and resources. The results are in...

Results this year at BHA have been amazing!

In our sixth form, 100% of students achieved at least two A Levels and 80% achieved at least three. Both of these figures are above the national average and have meant that every student who wanted to attend university, is now doing so. Other students are using their qualifications, skills and attributes to embark on job roles or higher level apprenticeships.

At GCSE, the proportion of students gaining five or more A*-C grades, including English and Mathematics is 56%, up by 5% from 2015. For pupils taking the EBacc, there was a 6% increase to 33%, which is significantly above last year's national average and will be among the highest in the West Midlands.

This year, Bristnall Hall Academy's overall progress scores are significantly positive and indicate that our students make better than expected progress across a range of subjects. Among a significant proportion of students who achieved A* and A grades, Hannah Gowing was among the highest achieving with an amazing 7 A* grades and 4 A grades. Amazing.

STEM Challenge day at ACE Academy

On 14th July 2016, 9 of our Years 8 and 9 students participated in the STEM Challenge for the West Midlands, hosted at the ACE Academy in Tipton. The day gave them an enjoyable insight into a higher level of science and technology. Activities included:

• Robotics: They were asked to build and program a robot to navigate a series of obstacles.

• E-FIT: They were asked to use police software to create an image of a 'criminal'.

• Vehicle: They were asked to design, build and then race a simple electric vehicle.

Throughout the day they worked with two young people from another school, which encouraged them to develop the team-work skills that they will need to study science and technology at a higher level. Our students did very well in all the challenges and two teams won the E-fit and the Vehicle challenge in their sessions. A brilliant day!



BBC Ten Pieces

A group of our amazing dancers took part in an exciting initiative led by BBC Learning, to open up the world of classical music to young people.

The BBC put together a repertoire of ten classical pieces of music to which young people could develop their own creative responses for. TBHA students chose to dance to Bernstein – 'Mambo' from 'Symphonic Dances from West Side Story'. The students spent two days with outside artists developing and choreographing their dance. They also created a video which introduces the story they told through their dance. This video was showcased on the BBC Ten Pieces Secondary website. They then went on to perform their creative response at the West Bromwich Town Hall in the BBC Ten Pieces Showcase on Monday 4th July 2016.





Paris Trip 2016

Following the success of the Paris trip in July 2015, students across Key Stage 3 at Bristnall Hall Academy had the opportunity to visit Paris again in July 2016.

The aim of the trip was for students to experience Mathematics and Design Technology in the real world.

The Modern Languages Department here at Bristnall Hall annually organise a residential weekend for Year 11, at Edgmond Hall in Shropshire.

This year, we took a large group of Year 11 GCSE French students along for a hands on, practical revision weekend in preparation for their Reading and Listening Examinations. Students were sorted into Foundation and Higher groups and spent the weekend revising key vocabulary; perfecting examination techniques; listening to and transcribing songs.

There was perfect weather for heading off into uncharted territories, with only a map and a sense of direction to help!

We are pleased to report that no student was lost during this activity. During the Saturday evening, after a packed schedule of revision and activities, the students were able to relax around a roaring camp fire as we munched our way through a lot of pizza. The students worked so well and were more confident when it came to tackling their examinations this summer, and the MFL department wished them "bonne chance"! Our strong results in the summer for GCSE French highlights what a valuable visit this was.

Castleton

June saw 98 of our Year 10 Geography students visiting Castleton as part of their GCSE controlled assessment on Tourism.



The students were gathering evidence to find out what sort of problems are caused by tourists in a honeypot location like Castleton. The students completed traffic surveys, environmental surveys, questionnaires and price comparison surveys. There was even time for pizza and cream teas, and some of our more energetic students climbed the steep hill up to Peveril Castle, which has overlooked Castleton since 1080. They worked very well in their groups, and coped with asking questions to members of the public with admirable skill and maturity. A wide range of data was collected, which will enable our students to achieve high marks in their controlled assessment tasks. Well done Year 10, you did yourselves proud.





Royal TV Society

During the Summer Term, Year 8s were invited to take part in an Enterprise Challenge which was delivered by the Royal Television Society and was based around careers within the broadcasting sector.

Teams became independent broadcasting companies for the day and had to design and develop a new TV Programme. One of the judges included Lllewella Bailey of Central news and BBC WM Radio fame.

The winning team represented Bristnall Hall Academy at the University of Wolverhampton in the RTS Grand Final, against eleven other schools from across the West Midlands. They presented their ideas to celebrity judges (almost!) including, the head of programming at BBC Birmingham, and although they didn't win, they did BHA proud!



Enterprising Politics

Coinciding with the buzz of the EU Referendum, Year 9s brushed up their parliamentary prowess during the Enterprising Politics Challenge.

Teams of 8 were tasked with developing a manifesto for a brand new political party, alongside campaigning, marketing and taking part in a press conference with all other parties. Local Councillors supported students with their campaigns and explained their role within local government. Each party delivered a 3 minute party broadcast and we held a Ballot to determine the elected party.

Summer Science

On 7th July 2016, 15 of our Year 10 students went to visit the Royal Society Summer Science Exhibition in London.

The exhibition was made up of 22 exhibits, featuring cutting edge science and research being done right now across the UK. The scientists involved in the research projects were on their stands to share discoveries and show the amazing technologies they use. Our students participated in many innovative hands-on activities related to the latest advances in Biology, Chemistry and Physics. A fantastic day!





Bristnall Hall Academy visit Buckingham Palace

Bristnall Hall Academy were lucky enough to be invited to Buckingham Palace to celebrate the 60th Anniversary of the Duke of Edinburgh Award.

The award started in 1956 to bridge the gap between boys leaving school and entering National Service, and has since then grown into the world's leading youth achievement award. More than 1,000 young people and volunteers were presented with their awards and licence plaques by around 60 celebrities including Anna Friel, Ben Cohen, Ronan Keating and Anton du Beke, who had all been drafted in to help Prince Philip and the Earl and Countess of Wessex hand out badges and certificates. As a licenced centre for the award, Bristnall Hall Academy offer students in Years 10 and 11 the opportunity to complete the award. In recognition of this, Mr Green and Miss Taylor received a plaque from England Rugby star Danny Cipriani and TV Sports presenter Jim Rosenthal.
