The lifesaving skill was supported and delivered throughout the day, at the academy, by West Midlands Ambulance Service.

We are passionate about our community and strive to have a positive impact in our local area. Through research, we realised that the nearest location of a registered defibrillator, with 24/7 access, was 3 miles away from the academy.

With this in mind, our students sought to raise funds to install a much needed defibrillator with an external cabinet for the community. Bristnall Hall Academy, together with other schools who were participating in Restart a Heart Day, were entered into a prize draw by West Midlands Ambulance Service and we were fortunate enough to win a defibrillator for our community!

The kids' names were Alfonze and Mackenzie and they were known to be very irritating and annoying.






Maths-tastic!




Paying our respects

As part of a writing scheme, Year 9 students took part in a sensory lesson where they imagined entering a market stall full of fruit.

To engage the students and get them really

thinking about their senses, and how they could incorporate it into their writing, the group used their senses to explore a range of fruits. They discussed and wrote down ideas about their smells; the different textures of the fruits; how they felt to the touch; the sounds they made when they were cut and bitten into, and of course, getting a chance to taste them too! Students then used their notes, as well as the skills gained from other lessons, such as the use of: figurative language; sentence variety; ambitious vocabulary; as well as a range of punctuation for effect, to write a creative

After an informative talk, students were able to select a book which matched their reading age to take home and read, and in doing so, begin their journey towards becoming more accomplished readers.

Two classes in Year 10 took part in a Victorian Christmas party at the end of last term.

They were treated to lessons on: how to make Christmas crackers, decorating Christmas cards and tasting some Victorian-style Christmas food. By the end of these lessons, they had managed to create lots of Victorian gifts to take home and embellish their own Christmas day with! As well as developing their English writing skills, and having a lot of fun, they also had the opportunity to learn more about the historical context behind their core text, "A Christmas Carol" by Charles Dickens.

Accountancy internship

The funds will be used to purchase a cabinet for the defibrillator that was donated to the Academy by West Midlands Ambulance Service.


Bake off!

Well done boys for your hard work and dedication.






This year, the Olympics and Paralympics took place in Brazil and I had the privilege of attending the Paralympic games in Rio de Janeiro.

I was able to meet many of the Paralympian athletes behind the scenes, whilst they prepared for events and celebrated their success at the games. I knew that Olympians work hard, but Paralympians display an unbelievable amount of determination, courage and have to dig deep to find the energy within, to attain similar feats. Whilst there, I came to realise that every athlete came with an encouraging story of how they overcame their disabilities to excel in the sporting world, alongside their able bodied counterparts.

Kadeena Cox was always sporty as a young student. She actively enjoyed a wide variety of sports and trained and competed regularly. It wasn't until she was 15 that she was diagnosed with Multiple Sclerosis. But this did not deter her from her goals as she accomplished Paralympic Gold medals in both track and cycling events, which was the first time this was ever achieved. Having met her, I realised the importance of believing in yourself, as Kadeena continues

to do, and how being focused on your goals can really work. Throughout all the games, one athlete stood out for me. A person who, in spite of his physical disability and in the face of all those who said he couldn't accomplish his goals, those who told him to guit when he reached the age of 30, is still achieving success at 40 years old. I was proud to witness the shear strength and determination of the man that again won Gold; Richard Whitehead. For anyone who watched this year's events, you may know that close on the heels of Richard's prosthetic blades was 14 year old Ntando Mahlangu of South Africa, who went on to win a Silver Paralympic medal in the same T42 event. What I found out from talking to Ntando after his success is that he only started to run in the four years prior to these games, as a direct result of watching a man with disabilities like himself achieve Gold at the London 2012. That man was Richard Whitehead. To think that regardless of the 26 year age gap, both men can run side by side and inspire not only each other but the next generation of kids.

They really are 'superhumans'!

After Bristnall Hall I studied Chemistry, Biology and Maths at King Edwards. I have just finished my Masters in Pharmacy at the University of Wolverhampton.
