





Impact of the Pupil Premium Grant

The evidence gathered through the school's self-evaluation process and data analysis, has shown that Pupil Premium intervention strategies have been successful and are starting to have a positive impact on closing the gap and improving the progress, standards and achievement of those students entitled to the additional funds.







- Example 1 Expected progress in English and Maths combined is very close to national average and closer than non FSM students to national average.
- Example 2 In English Year 11 20.2% of pupil premium students achieved 4 levels progress in comparison to 21% of non-pupil premium students.
- Example 3 Low attainers average point score students are performing in line or better than National Average over the last 3 years.
- Example 4 Average point scores for all qualifications shows a trend over three years either in line or significantly better than national average.
- Example 5 Students are much better than national average on this measure and pupil premium students receive significantly less exclusions in comparison with national average.
- Example 6 Our Attendance Coach helped to maintain or improve the attendance of 30 pupil
 premium students on his caseload. These students were considered below Academy targets,
 persistent absentees or hard to reach students.
